

### FROM THE WEST

March 15 is well known as the "*ides of March*". But why do we need to "beware" them? What's so ominous about this otherwise normal day? And why has this mid-month point become a harbinger of ill fortune?

First, let's talk calendars—ancient Roman calendars.

The *ides of March* is the 74th day in the Roman calendar, corresponding to 15 March. It was marked by several religious observances and was notable for the Romans as a deadline for settling debts. In 44 BC, it became notorious as the date of the assassination of Julius Caesar which made the Ides of March a turning point in Roman history.

Unlike today, the ancient Romans did not number each day of a month from the first to the last day. Instead, they counted back from three fixed points of the month:

- \* The <u>nones</u> (nine days before the *ides*) was equivalent to the seventh day of March, May, July, and October, and the fifth day of the other months. Originally, the <u>nones</u> corresponded to the <u>first quarter</u> of the moon.
- \* The <u>ides</u> were the fifteenth day of March, May, July, and October, and the thirteenth day of the other months. Originally the <u>ides</u> were supposed to be determined by the <u>full moon</u>, reflecting the <u>lunar origin of the Roman calendar</u>. In the earliest calendar, the <u>ides of March</u> would have been the first full moon of the new year.
- \* The *kalends* (the first of the following month).

So, the Roman day of the month was reckoned by counting back the days (including the starting and ending days) before the *calends*, *nones*, and *ides*. March 2 was the Latin equivalent of "six days before the nones of March." March 13 was the equivalent of "three days before the ides of March." March 27 was the equivalent of "six days before the calends of April."

How did the *ides of March* become superstitious?

The Roman general and statesmen Julius Caesar was assassinated by conspiring senators, notably including Marcus Brutus, on March 15 in 44 BCE. His rule, and murder, effectively ended the Roman republic—and changed the course of history.

Shakespeare dramatized the assassination of Julius Caesar (and its aftermath) in his well-known tragedy. Early in the play, a <u>soothsayer</u> warns Caesar to "Beware the ides of March." On this fateful day as he was stabbed, Shakespeare has the dying dictator say, in Latin, as he recognizes his one-time friend Brutus among the assassins: *Et tu, Brute?* ("You, too, Brutus?")

Caesar probably never said these words. Nor was Shakespeare the first to make them up - though he certainly helped immortalize them, and the *ides of March*, in Western culture.







### **§809.320. LIFE MEMBERSHIP.**

A Lodge may adopt a standing resolution providing for a life membership plan, which shall forever exempt a member making the required payment into the plan from the payment of dues in the Lodge. The resolution may be adopted, amended or revoked at any Stated Meeting by a majority vote of the members present. Any such action must be presented, in writing, at a preceding Stated Meeting and written notice must be given to each Lodge member setting forth the text of the proposed action and the date of the Stated Meeting at which the vote is to be taken. The plan must provide that a life membership shall be granted upon payment of:

A. A sum of money which is equal to or greater than 22 times the Lodge's annual dues at the time of purchase of the life membership; or

B. A sum of money equal to the Lodge's annual dues at the time of purchase of the life membership multiplied by the factor indicated opposite the member's age in the following schedule:

Age 49 and under, a factor equal to or greater than 24 times annual dues; 50 to 54 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 20 times annual dues; 55 to 59 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 18 times annual dues; 60 to 64 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 16 times annual dues; 65 to 71 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 14 times annual dues; Age 72 and over, a factor equal to or greater than 12 times annual dues.
