

FROM THE WEST

A pioneering pilot, aeronautical engineer, and military leader, Brother James H. Doolittle served our nation in active duty for nearly 50 years. He is best known for his courageous raid in the Pacific Theater during the onset of World War II. Doolittle led a daring bombing effort over the Japanese mainland on April 18, 1942, marking the first American attack on the Japanese mainland.

This month is the 80th anniversary of that raid.

In 1940, Doolittle returned to the U.S. Army Air Corps with the rank of Major. Later, when the United States was drawn into World War II after the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor, General Henry H. "Hap" Arnold summoned Doolittle to lead a retaliatory raid on the Japanese mainland. At the time, Japan's defensive perimeter in the Pacific was wide enough to seemingly make it invulnerable to conventional carrier-based attacks.

At the start of the war, Japan maintained control of a significant defensive perimeter in the Pacific, seemingly fortifying the empire against naval attacks and armed invasion. Doolittle's task was top-secret: he would lead a raid of 16 specially modified B-25 bombers from the aircraft carrier USS Hornet, with targets in Tokyo, Kobe, Yokohama, Osaka, and Nagoya. Unfortunately, the Hornet was detected by the Japanese, forcing the mission to launch a day early and focus the attack exclusively on Tokyo alone, rather than all five cities.

Doolittle led his squadron into storms and anti-aircraft fire, reaching Tokyo and striking industrial facilities and a light cruiser. The "Doolittle Raiders", as they came to be called, then continued toward China in an attempt to land in areas controlled by Chinese Nationalists. Sadly, all 16 planes ran out of fuel and crashed, killing three and causing eight to be captured by the Japanese.

Although nearly thwarted, the attack was a boost to American morale and a blow to the Japanese. While the human and industrial damage was minor, the Japanese responded to the Doolittle Raid by redistributing fighter groups to protect their cities better, opening a gap in their defenses. The U.S. military exploited this gap in their Pacific defense and won a decisive victory at the Battle of Midway in early June 1942.

Doolittle was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Franklin D. Roosevelt and was promoted two ranks to brigadier general for his role as the head of the mission. In 1985, President Ronald Reagan promoted Doolittle to a full four-star general. Gen. James H. Doolittle died on September 27, 1993, at the age of 96.

Brother Doolittle joined Freemasonry during his tenure in the Signal Corps Reserve. Although a resident of California, he was deployed in Louisiana when he sought to receive his Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft, and Master Mason degrees. Both the Grand Lodges of California and Louisiana issued special dispensations to accommodate his military service. Doolittle received all three degrees and was raised a Master Mason on August 16th, 1918, in Lake Charles Lodge No. 16, Louisiana. Doolittle remained in the fraternity throughout his life and later became a member of Hollenbeck Lodge No. 319 in Los Angeles, California. He eventually became a Shriner and joined the Scottish Rite, ultimately receiving the rank and decoration of Inspector General Honorary, 33°.

Please remember to fly your flag on Monday, April 18th, in remembrance of the "Doolittle Raiders", the daring raid they undertook, and its effect on the eventual outcome of the war.







§809.320. LIFE MEMBERSHIP.

A Lodge may adopt a standing resolution providing for a life membership plan, which shall forever exempt a member making the required payment into the plan from the payment of dues in the Lodge. The resolution may be adopted, amended or revoked at any Stated Meeting by a majority vote of the members present. Any such action must be presented, in writing, at a preceding Stated Meeting and written notice must be given to each Lodge member setting forth the text of the proposed action and the date of the Stated Meeting at which the vote is to be taken. The plan must provide that a life membership shall be granted upon payment of:

A. A sum of money which is equal to or greater than 22 times the Lodge's annual dues at the time of purchase of the life membership; or

B. A sum of money equal to the Lodge's annual dues at the time of purchase of the life membership multiplied by the factor indicated opposite the member's age in the following schedule:

Age 49 and under, a factor equal to or greater than 24 times annual dues; 50 to 54 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 20 times annual dues; 55 to 59 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 18 times annual dues; 60 to 64 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 16 times annual dues; 65 to 71 inclusive, a factor equal to or greater than 14 times annual dues; Age 72 and over, a factor equal to or greater than 12 times annual dues.
