From "The Spirit of Masonry" – 1843 (<u>http://masoniceducation.com/article/?article=a-lesson-for-freemasons</u>)

Your TROWEL will teach you that nothing is united together without proper cement: no strict union, nor external polish can be made without it. And, as the Trowel connects each stone together by a proper disposition of the cement, so charity, that bond of perfection and of all social union (which I earnestly recommend to you all), links separate minds and various interests together; and, like the radii of a circle, that extend from the center to every part of the circumference, makes each member have a tender regard for the real welfare of the whole community.

But as some members will be refractory in every society, your Hammer will likewise teach you how to use becoming discipline and correction towards such like offenders. If they will not submit to rule, you may strike off the excrescences of their swelling pride, till they sink into a modest deportment. Are they irregular in their practices? Your Hammer will instruct you to strike off each irregularity, and fit them to act a decent part on the stage of life. Do any affect things above their stations? Your Hammer will teach you to press them down to their proper level that they may learn, in the school of discipline, that necessary knowledge - to be courteous.

What the HAMMER is to the workman, that enlightened reason is to the passions in the human mind: it curbs ambition, that aspires to its own and neighbor's hurt: it depresses envy, moderates anger, checks every rising frailty, and encourages every good disposition of the soul; from whence must arise that comely order, that delightful self-complacency "Which nothing earthly gives or can destroy, The soul's calm sunshine, and the heart-felt joy."

Thus, from our instruments may we all be instructed to raise a stately fabric of good works, upon the strong foundation of faith, that we may be fitted at last to inhabit that glorious house, not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens!

A Special hello to a deserving worthy Brother Mason

Brother George Emmett Brakeall of Rock Hill, SC was born in Ohio on April 14, 1926. He was Raised a Master Mason in Oklahoma Altus Lodge #62 on August 2, 1962. He affiliated with SW Hackett Lodge on December 7, 1962. Then he was incorrectly shown as "suspended for nonpayment of dues". This error was finally corrected after many years and he has therefore been restored as a Master Mason in Good Standing for 53 years. He has finally received his truly deserved 50 year pin. Brother George is also a Life Member of the Scottish Rite, and we congratulate him and wish him Happy 90th Birthday.

The Blazing Star; an Evolving Symbol

Hutchinson said "It is the first and most exalted object that demands our attention in the lodge" In the earliest Monitor, immediately after the revival of 1717 the Blazing Star is not mentioned but was introduced in the instructions of 1735 in the explanation of the Mosaic Pavement.

The lecture credited to Dunckerley the Blazing Star is said to represent the star which led Magi to Bethlehem. The Prestonion Lecture explains that awful period before the almighty delivered the two stone tablets of the Ten Commandments to his faithful servant Moses.

In the lecture taught by Webb and generally adopted in the U.S. is at first commemorative of the star that guided the Wise men by Devine Providence to Bethlehem. However to some to be objectionable as its application in Christian Religion the Baltimore Masonic Convention of 1843 omitted the reference to Bethlehem and retained the allusion to Devine Providence alone.

At various time the Blazing Star has it's meaning as Devine Providence, Star of Bethlehem, Prudence, Beauty and the Sun. The Blazing Star is not only a Masonic Symbol, but an ancient and historic one from early days. Man has always looked to the heavens for Guidance.

As I was doing some reading on various Masonic scholars I came across an answer to a question that I myself have thought about many times in my times since joining the Fraternity. That question is what makes a man a Mason or when does a man become a Mason? That is a question that comes with many answers, some short and simple, others, such as illustrated below, is longer. The following is from an Ordained Baptist minister and a Freemason, the Very Reverend Newton. "WHEN IS A MAN A MASON? When he can look out over the rivers, the hills, and the far horizon with a profound sense of his own littleness in the vast scheme of things, and yet have faith, hope, and courage which is the root of every virtue. When he knows that down in his heart every man is as noble, as vile, as divine, as diabolic, and as lonely as himself, and seeks to know, to forgive, and to love his fellow man. When he knows how to sympathize with men in their sorrows, yea, even in their sins knowing that each man fights a hard fight against many odds. When he has learned how to make friends and to keep them, and above all how to keep friends with himself. When he loves flowers, can hunt birds without a gun, and feels the thrill of an old forgotten joy when he hears the laugh of a little child. When he can be happy and high-minded amid the meaner drudgeries of life. When starcrowned trees and the glint of sunlight on flowing waters, subdue him like the thought of one much loved and long dead. When no voice of distress reaches his ears in vain, and no hand seeks his aid without response. When he finds good in every faith that helps any man to lay hold of divine things and sees majestic meanings in life, whatever the name of that faith may be. When he can look into a wayside puddle and see something beyond mud, and into the face of the most forlorn fellow mortal and see something beyond sin. When he knows how to pray, how to love, how to hope. When he has kept faith with himself, with his fellow man, and with his God; in his hand a sword for evil, in his heart a bit of a song -- glad to live, but not afraid to die! Such a man has found the only real secret of Masonry, and the one which it is trying to give to all the world.-Reverend Joseph Fort Newton, Raised on May 28, 1902 in Friendship Lodge No. 7 in Dixon, Illinois and from 1911-1913 was the Grand Chaplin for the Grand Lodge of Iowa. He has authored many masonic books, the best known being The Builders, published in 1914. I hope that his answer may help you formulate your own someday when someone asks you, what makes a man a Mason?
