Brethren and Ladies;

This month I was thinking of our Lodge and the wages now paid to members, and the wages traditionally paid during the building of King Solomon’s Temple.

Neither Scripture nor Josephus gives any definite information on the wages paid to the workmen during the building of King Solomon’s Temple, nor is there any Masonic claim on the subject.

We do know that the edifice was immense. We also know that vast quantities of commodities and great sums of money were paid as wages and bonuses to the workmen. It is estimated that the corn, wine and oil paid to the servants of Hiram King of Tyre totaled 190,000 bushels of corn, 150,000 gallons of wine, and an equal amount of oil. The free gifts made to workmen by Solomon were equal to 32 million dollars, and the wages totaled 672,000,000.

It is presumed that the wages were paid accordingly to skill levels. In Speculative Masonry the labors of the workmen are moral and spiritual, and the wages remunerations, and rewards for faithful services are the personal delights in goods accomplished and equitable recognitions by the Great Architect.

One of the most rewarding aspects of Masonry is the Ritual work that we do. When our Brethren take part in the ritual, or come to share in the Degree, we feel the rewards in sharing with one another.

This is a good time to remind all of our brethren to come on down to Lodge and share the fellowship with us.

When Brothers Richard E. Byrd and Bernt Balchen first flew over the North and South Poles, they dropped a Masonic flag on each Pole. Then, in the 1933-35 expedition, Brother Balchen tossed his Shrine Fez on the North Pole.

In 1920, Gate City Lodge #522 in Kansas City, MO met every day of the week except Sunday to confer a record 1,107 degrees, averaging 21 degrees a week. - *History of Freemasonry Missouri Lodge of Research.*

THE WORKING TOOLS



Welcome to the Month of July. You may have noticed in June that my article from May was mistakenly repeated. Here is some of the intended June content which I will borrow for July:

On the longest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere, the Sun at meridian height is directly overhead on the Tropic of Cancer; while at the Arctic Circle it remains above the horizon for 24 hours, marking the Summer Solstice on June 21st as depicted below.



Other days of note in June included Father's Day on the 15th, the Nativity of St. John the Baptist on the 24th, and after the New Moon on the evening of the 28th, the beginning of Ramadan.

In July the Earth is at Aphelion, or furthest point from the Sun, on the 3rd.

On July 4th, we celebrate the signing of the Declaration of Independence from the British Crown, by the Continental Congress in 1776.

The whole point of the Declaration of Independence was to gain Liberty, that was being oppressed by one government, and establish a new government that was yet to be fully manifested, until Victory at Yorktown, the ratification of the Constitution, the abolishment of the Articles of Confederation, and finally, the first session of the Third Branch of the Federal Government, the Supreme Court, on February 2, 1790.

See you at throwback time, during Table Lodge, on July 11th.


