#### **BET YOU DIDN'T KNOW THIS**

The famous Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor was designed by a Frenchman, Frederick A. Bartholdi, a Freemason. The Grand Lodge of New York laid the cornerstone with Masonic ceremonies on August 5, 1885.

On his famous solo flight over the Atlantic in 1927 Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, a Mason, wore the square and compasses on his jacket as a good luck emblem.

Leroy Gordon Cooper, Jr., famous astronaut, on his 22 orbit flight carried a Masonic coin in his pocket as well as a blue Masonic flag which he later presented to his mother lodge, Carbondale No. 82, Carbondale, Colorado.

At one time Golden Rule Lodge No. 5 of Stanstead, Canada, occupied a lodge room which was bisected by the boundary between Canada and the United States. It had entrances from the Vermont and Canadian sides; the membership of the lodge consisted of men from both sides of the border.

#### WISDOM, STRENGTH AND BEAUTY

Triads are groups of three ideas or objects. Triads appear in nature. To early man, the cosmos consisted of the sun, the moon, and the stars. He called the natural elements earth, wind, and fire. Rhetoric is similarly infused with triads. We remember the three things that abide which are faith, hope, and charity.

Triads are prominently employed in Lodges and Masonic writings. Threes appear prominently in the second degree where Fellow Crafts are reminded of the three degrees of Masonry and the three principal officers of the lodge. We learn that a Lodge is not singular. A Lodge is not dual. It is plural with a minimum of three. Similarly, displaying of the three Greater Lights and the three lesser lights are central rituals for the opening and closing of the Lodge. As the furniture of the Lodge, they separately are symbols with meanings and lessons, but the fact that they are grouped into threes is not accidental.

The three pillars are named wisdom, strength, and beauty. They are said to help make Masons better men. Naturally, we could have added other virtues to the list: but the fact that there is but three draws your attention. The three Greater Lights parallel the three lesser lights and the three grand principles of Masonry are: brotherly love, relief and truth.

The three degrees emphasize three stages of life. Our youth and adolescence are emphasized in our training as Entered Apprentices; our manhood and useful work are keys to the Fellowcraft degree; and contemplating our own mortality is vividly illustrated in the Master Mason degree.

## MASONIC ACTIVITY, WHAT IS NEEDED? TAKEN FROM THE JUNIOR WARDEN'S RETREAT OF 2010

Since young men are the leading area of growth for Masonry, what are they looking for and what will keep them interested in coming back to Lodge and getting more involved?

The study done by American Meeting Association showed that these young men are here to learn. They want fewer and more powerful sessions. They want the ability to express their opinions without fear of rejection. The same study showed that this is true for most of the generations included in the study.

It stated years ago, that much of our young men growth could be attributed to Dan Brown and his books, the Lost Symbol, The Da Vinci Code, etc. His books, especially the Lost Symbol, stirred the curiosity of the younger generations.

They are searching for more and deeper knowledge and believe that our venerable institution can enlighten them and give them direction. The conclusion in our surveys was obvious, if we wish to continue and thrive as the greatest fraternity, we have to offer, to these "new" generations of Masons, the things they are searching for.

Our ritual Lodge work is, in itself, inspirational and meaningful. Much can be learned from the openings, the obligations and the lectures, but what is also important is the deeper meaning and mysteries behind even that ritual and those lectures. Many Brothers never explore, question or even understand that those mysteries exist, and have found that Masonry is Stated Meetings and charity.

I believe that by educating the Brothers on these and even more of the ancient mysteries, they will thirst for more and will increase their involvement in the fraternity.

#### FREEMASONRY DEFINED

Freemasonry is the science by which morality is taught through the visible symbols and instructive traditions associated with the erection of King Solomon's Temple some 3,000 years ago. Like every science and permanent institution, Freemasonry is built on certain conceded principles. These include a belief in the one living and true God, a revelation of His will, the resurrection of the body, and the immortality of the soul. Masonry is an institution accepting men of all faiths and supportive of every religion believing in one God. It denies to no man his particular theological or secular beliefs, but rather complements those beliefs. Without an expressed belief in these principles, no man can ever become a Freemason. Acceptance of the Fatherhood of God is the very foundation of the Masonic Institution. From the Fatherhood of God logically flows the Brotherhood of Man
